Member institutions hold collections that offer a historical perspective on topics in all these fields and more. At least 24 fellowships will be awarded. Each grant will provide a stipend of \$5,000 for a minimum of eight weeks of research at participating institutions.

The American Bar Foundation (ABF), in partnership with AccessLex Institute, is committed to developing the next generation of scholars interested in empirical and interdisciplinary research on legal and higher education. The purpose of the fellowship is to assist emerging scholars who are studying issues of access, affordability, or value in legal and higher education. This fellowship program seeks to cultivate a professional network of scholars who will produce innovative, objective, empirical, and interdisciplinary research in the field. Applications are invited from outstanding students who are candidates for LLM degrees, SJD degrees, and Ph.D. degrees across a broad range of disciplines, who will have completed all doctoral requirements except the dissertation by September 1, 2024. Doctoral research must address significant issues in the field and show promise of a major contribution to social scientific understanding of legal or higher education. Students from underrepresented minority groups and those attending schools not typically represented among law faculty are especially encouraged to apply.

American Center for Mongolian Studies Field Research or Library Fellowship Field Research Fellowship:

The program will provide awards of up to \$4,000 for student, post-doctoral, or faculty to conduct short-term field research in Mongolia. The program will provide up to \$4,000 per individual award (allowable expenses include domestic and international airfare, in-country transportation, and up to \$1,000 per month for a research stipend unless otherwise agreed upon; a detailed budget is required) or up to \$8,000 per joint award. Research projects in any field, including humanities, sciences and social sciences are eligible.

Library Fellowship:

This fellowship supports advanced U.S. graduate students, faculty members, or professionals in library and information sciences from colleges and universities to conduct short-term library development projects and/or research in Mongolia for a period of up to 12 weeks between May and October. The fellowship is supported with funding from the US State Department Education and Cultural Affairs Bureau through a grant by the Council of American Overseas Research Centers. Library development projects in any area that address enhancing collection content, resource accessibility, and training are eligible.

American Political Science Association (APSA) Diversity Fellowship Program (DFP)

The APSA Diversity Fellowship Program (formerly known as the APSA Minority Fellowship Program or MFP) is a fellowship competition for individuals from underrepresented backgrounds applying to or in the early stages of doctoral programs in political science. Applicants for the Diversity Fellowship Program Spring Cycle must be a first or second year graduate student, and currently enrolled in a political science PhD program. Fellows will receive a one-time award of \$2000 to support their graduate study.

The purpose of the Dissertation Research Award program is to assist science-oriented doctoral students of psychology with research costs. Applicants must have had their dissertation proposals approved by their dissertation committees prior to application. Each psychology department (i.e., not individual programs within a department) may endorse no more than three (3) students per year for the APA Dissertation Research Award.

Carson Scholars Program in Environmental and Science Communication

Carson Scholars is a one-year graduate fellowship dedicated to training students in the art of environmental and science communication. It is an interdisciplinary program and students from all fields are encouraged to apply, so long as their scholarly inquiry is related to science and/or the environment. Applicants must be graduate students enrolled in a terminal degree program at the University of Arizona to be eligible to apply. Scholars receive environmental communication training, interdisciplinary professional mentorship, and a \$5000 scholarship over the course of the 2024-25 school year.

The Dr. James A. Ferguson Emerging Infectious Diseases Research Initiatives for Student Enhancement RISE (Ferguson RISE) Fellowship Program supports public health research and professional development in infectious diseases and health disparities, focusing on increasing knowledge and interest in public health research careers among students from underrepresented populations. The Ferguson RISE Fellowship program includes a full-time summer (Memorial Day through the first week in August), 6-month part-time or full-time, and 12-month full-time public health research fellowship experiences. The Ferguson RISE Fellowship is funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Jefferson Scholars Foundation National Fellowship Program

Under the leadership of the Jefferson Scholars Foundation, the National Fellowship Program: The National Fellowship Program supports outstanding scholars at leading institutions of higher education who are completing dissertations in United States politics, with an emphasis on historical and institutional analyses of politics, public policy, and foreign relations. An applicant must be a Ph.D. candidate who is either expecting to complete his or her dissertation by the conclusion of the Fellowship year or has outlined a detailed and workable two-year write-up plan that is persuasively documented. It funds up to four National Fellows per year to support dissertation research and writing; awarding each Fellow a stipend of \$30,000 in their first year, and \$30,000 should they qualify for a second year.

Howard Mayer Brown Fellowship

Intended to increase the presence of minority scholars and teachers in musicology, the fellowship supports one year of graduate work for a student. Students must be at a U.S. or Canadian university who is a member of a historically underrepresented group, including, in the U.S., African Americans, Native Americans, Hispanic Americans, and Asian Americans, and, in Canada, aboriginal peoples and visible minorities (as defined by Canadian legislation). Preference will normally be given to candidates who are citizens or permanent residents of a North American country.

MacDowell Colony Fellowship (Art Residency)

The MacDowell Colony provides time, space, and an inspiring environment to artists of exceptional talent. A MacDowell Fellowship, or residency, consists of exclusive use of a studio, accommodations, and three prepared meals a day for up to eight weeks. There are no residency fees. About 300 artists in seven disciplines are awarded fellowships each year and the sole criterion for acceptance is artistic excellence. MacDowell encourages artists from all backgrounds and all countries in the following disciplines: architecture, film/video arts, interdisciplinary arts, literature, music composition, theatre, and visual arts. Applicants cannot be enrolled in a degree-seeking program during the residency season for which they are applying. Doctoral candidates who have completed all coursework may apply.

Matthew Tobin Cappetta Archaeological Scholarship

Matthew Tobin Cappetta Archaeological Scholarship provides funding for graduate students studying archaeology or ethnoarchaeology of the American Southwest and the South American Andes. The scholarship covers tuition, course fees, and books or course materials for graduate-level classroom and field-based courses in anthropology, with emphasis in archaeology or ethnoarchaeology. It also supports travel to attend field schools or directed study projects that lead to research papers, reports, journal articles, or advanced field research. Students working in other American regions, whether they are from the United States or other countries, will be considered if their research involves significant collaboration with Native American Indians.

Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) Health Policy Research Scholars

Health Policy Research Scholars (HPRS) is a four-year national leadership development program for full-time doctoral students from nonclinical, research-focused disciplines in which policy is a key lever for change (e.g., urban planning; political science; economics; anthropology; education; social work; sociology). HPRS is designed for students who are committed to ensuring their research is aligned with the health needs of communities. Applicants must be starting full-time, second-year doctoral studies in fall 2024. Applicants must be from populations underrepresented in specific doctoral disciplines and/or historically marginalized backgrounds. Examples of marginalized backgrounds include, but are not limited to, first-generation college graduates; individuals from lower socioeconomic backgrounds; individuals from communities of color; and individuals with disabilities.

Society for the Advancement of Behavior Analysis (SABA) Innovative Student Research Grant

The purpose of the grant is to provide funding for students in psychology or behavior analysis doctoral programs and students in psychology or behavior analysis master's programs that can support applied or basic research in the experimental analysis of behavior. Applicants must be enrolled or have been accepted in a doctoral or master's program in a department of psychology, education, behavioral science, or an allied discipline in which there is enough behaviorally oriented faculty members to supervise the proposed research. Applicants must have at least one full academic year remaining in the program and sufficient time to complete the project after the grant application deadline.

Society for the Study of Social Problems (SSSP) Racial/Ethnic Minority Graduate **Fellowship**

The Society for the Study of Social Problems (SSSP), in keeping with its philosophy of active engagement with social problems, participation in social problem solutions, and advancement of knowledge through study, service and critical analysis, established the Racial/Ethnic Minority Graduate Fellowship. Among the purposes of the fellowship is to establish a formal commitment to diversity through support of two minority doctoral students in the social and/or behavioral sciences inclusive of course work or dissertation research support who demonstrates a commitment, through his, her, or their scholarly examination, of any aspect of inequality, injustice, and oppression. Eligible recipients are: A person identified as either American Indian or Alaska Native, Arab/Middle Eastern/North African, Asian/Asian-American, Black/African American, Hispanic/Latinx, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, or, including Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) from one of the aforementioned groups, and accepted into an accredited doctoral program in any one of the social and/or behavioral sciences so as to expand their perspectives in the pursuit and investigations into social problems.

Western Association of Women Historians (WAWH) Founders' Dissertation Fellowship

The Founders' Dissertation Fellowship recognizes graduate students who show promise of significant contributions to historical scholarship. Award funds may be used for purposes directly or indirectly related to the dissertation, such as for expenses related to research, attendance at scholarly conferences, or that incurred in the preparation of the dissertation. Applicants must be graduate students who have been advanced to candidacy, are writing the dissertation at the time of application, and are engaged in scholarship that is historical in nature, though the degree may be in related fields. Applicants should expect the Ph.D. no earlier than December of the calendar year in which the award is made.

The Graduate Teaching Fellowship Program is a collaboration between ASME and mechanical engineering departments to encourage outstanding doctoral candidates in mechanical engineering education (and related engineering fields), particularly women and minorities. Neuroscience Scholars Program (graduate and postdocs)

The Neuroscience Scholars Program (NSP) is a two-year online training program open to underrepresented graduate students and postdoctoral researchers. Building on a 40-year history, NSP provides resources focused on career advancement issues, the research process, and cutting-edge scientific content. NSP participants have access to live events and webinars, educational resources, an online group for those seeking career connections, and guidance from mentors and NSP Alumni. The Neuroscience Scholars Program is comprised of two opportunities: NSP Fellows and NSP Associates. Up to 18 applicants will be selected for the NSP Fellows Program. Newkirk Fellowship

The Newkirk Fellowship provides financial support for research visits to the High Altitude Observatory (HAO) of the National Center for Atmospheric research (NCAR) located in Boulder, Colorado. The scientific program of HAO is solar-terrestrial physics, broadly interpreted. Included is solar physics, physics of the heliosphere, the study of geospace and space weather, and the physics of the Earth's magnetosphere and upper atmosphere. The total supported visit length is 9 months, which can be spread out over up to three years.
