#### **American Association of University Women Dissertation Fellowships**

American Fellowships support women scholars completing doctoral dissertations, conducting postdoctoral research, or finishing research for publication. The purpose of the Dissertation Fellowship is to offset a scholar's living expenses while she completes her dissertation. The fellowship must be used for the final year of writing the dissertation.

## **American Philosophical Society Fellowships and Grants**

The American Philosophical Society maintains several grant or fellowship programs in a wide range of fields. The Blumberg Grants in Astrobiology, Franklin Research Grant, Lewis and Clark Fund, Lewis and Clark Fund in Astrobiology, Library David Center Fellowship, Library Digital Humanities Fellowship, Library Digital Knowledge Sharing Fellowship, Library Short-Term Fellowship, Library NASI Undergraduate Internship, and Phillips Fund for Native American Research programs award small amounts (\$1,000 to \$6,000) for modest research purposes. The Daland Fellowship in Clinical Investigation, John Hope Franklin Dissertation Fellowship, Library Long-Term Post-Doctoral Fellowship, Library Long-Term Pre-Doctoral Fellowship, and Mellon Curatorial Post-Doctoral Fellowship programs award much larger amounts (\$28,000 to \$60,000) in highly selective competitions.

#### **Boren Fellowships for International Study**

Boren Fellowships, an initiative of the National Security Education Program, provide unique funding opportunities for U.S. graduate students to study less commonly taught languages in world regions critical to U.S. interests, and underrepresented in study abroad, including Africa, Asia, Eurasia, Latin America, and the Middle East. The countries of Western Europe, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand are excluded. Boren Fellows represent a vital pool of highly motivated individuals who wish to work in the federal national security arena. In exchange for funding, Boren Fellows commit to working in the federal government for at least one year after graduation.

### **Chateaubriand Fellowship**

The Chateaubriand Fellowship is a grant offered by the Embassy of France in the United States. It supports outstanding Ph.D. students from American universities who wish to conduct research in France for a period ranging from 4 to 9 months. The program is divided into two subprograms: Science, Technology, Engineering, Math, and Health; and Humanities and Social Science. Knowledge of French is not required and is left to the discretion of the host laboratory.

## Critical Language Scholarship (CLS) Program

The Critical Language Scholarship (CLS) Program is an immersive summer opportunity for American college and university students to learn languages essential to America's engagement with the world. Each summer, American undergraduate and graduate students enrolled at U.S. colleges and universities across the country, spend eight to ten weeks learning one of thirteen languages at an intensive study abroad institute. The CLS Program is designed to promote rapid language gains and essential intercultural fluency in regions that are critical to U.S. national security and economic prosperity. Languages offered include the following: Arabic, Azerbaijani, Chinese, Hindi, Indonesian, Japanese, Korean, Persian, Portuguese, Russian, Swahili, Turkish and Urdu.

### **FLAS Fellowships for Foreign Language Learning**

The Foreign Language and Area Studies Fellowships (FLAS) program funds centers around the country that provide fellowships to promote foreign language competencies. The University of Arizona is home to a FLAS program in the **Center for Middle Eastern Studies** and **Latin American Studies**. You may apply to programs at some other institutions as well. Programs are either for the academic year or the summer.

#### **Fulbright-Hays Doctoral Dissertation Research Abroad Grant**

The purpose of the Fulbright-Hays Doctoral Dissertation Research Abroad (FH DDRA) fellowship is to contribute to the development and improvement of the study of modern foreign languages and area studies in the U.S. by supporting full-time dissertation research abroad. Research projects must focus on one or more of the following geographic areas: Africa, East Asia, Southeast Asia and the Pacific Islands, South Asia, the Near East, Central and Eastern Europe and Eurasia, and the Western Hemisphere (excluding the U.S. and its territories).

# **Fulbright Scholarship for U.S. Students**

Fulbright offers recent graduate opportunities for personal and professional development and international experience that fosters mutual understanding among nations through study and research abroad. Students design their own projects, which may include university coursework, library or field research, classes in a music or art school, independent projects in the social or life sciences, assistant teach English, a combination of these or other activities.

#### **Gates Cambridge Scholarship**

The Gates Cambridge Scholarship program was established in October 2000 by a donation of US \$210m from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to the University of Cambridge. Scholarships are awarded to outstanding applicants from countries outside the UK to pursue a full-time postgraduate degree in any subject available at the University of Cambridge who meet all four criteria

(outstanding intellectual ability, reason for choice of course, a commitment to improving the lives of others, and leadership potential). All courses will require an undergraduate degree, some may require a master's or other degree - or professional experience.

## **German Chancellor Fellowship**

The Alexander von Humboldt Foundation is searching for the leaders of tomorrow – from Brazil, China, India, South Africa, and the USA. The German Chancellor Fellowship allows recent graduates to spend one year carrying out a self-designed project in Germany in any field, as long as the project creates a positive social impact. German proficiency is not needed, although German language courses are provided along with a study tour, opportunity to meet the Chancellor, and other benefits.

#### **Global Health Equity Scholars (GHES)**

The Global Health Equity Scholars (GHES) program is a 12-month mentored global health research training fellowship at select institutions in low-and-middle-income countries (LMIC). The GHES program was established in 2012 and is comprised of four US partner institutions – Yale University, the University of California at Berkeley, Stanford University, and the University of Arizona – that together have collaborations in 24 LMICs representing Africa, Latin America, the Caribbean, South and Southeast Asia, the Middle East, Eastern Europe, and Oceania. The program is designed for pre- and post-doctoral trainees from the U.S. and post-doctoral trainees from collaborating LMICs who are dedicated to pursuing a career in global health and want to gain a solid scientific research foundation in a collaborative environment to develop into productive, independent researchers in global health. GHES offers hand-on opportunities to conduct research projects relevant to the health priorities of stakeholders and

partners at established medical and research institutions and project sites in collaborating LMICs while being mentored by dedicated experts.

## **Hispanic Scholarship Fund (HSF) Scholars**

The Hispanic Scholarship Fund (HSF) empowers students and parents with the knowledge and resources to successfully complete a higher education, while providing support services and scholarships to as many exceptional students, HSF Scholars and Alumni as possible. Every year, HSF selects 10,000 outstanding students as HSF Scholars from a broad and talented pool of applicants. HSF Scholars have access to a full range of invaluable Scholar Support Services, including career services, mentorship, leadership development, knowledge building, and wellness training. Finally, and importantly, HSF awards more than \$30 million in Scholarships annually and, depending upon available funds, HSF Scholars may also be eligible to receive a scholarship, which range from \$500-\$5,000 and are awarded directly to students.

# Margaret McNamara Educational Grants for Women from Developing Countries

# National Science Foundation Graduate Research Fellowships (NSF GRFP)

The National Science Foundation aims to ensure the vitality of the human resource base in biological science, technology, engineering, mathematics, physical science, earth science, and social science in the United States and to reinforce its diversity by offering approximately 1,000 graduate fellowships in this competition. The Graduate Research Fellowship provides three years of support for graduate study leading to research-based masters or doctoral degrees and is intended for students who are at the early stages of their graduate study.

#### **Paul & Daisy Soros Fellowships for New Americans**

The Paul & Daisy Soros Fellowships support immigrants and children of immigrants pursuing full-time graduate degrees in the United States. The fellowship is open to all fields of study and accredited full-time graduate programs. Eligible applicants must hold a bachelor's degree by fall 2025 and be enrolled in or applying to a graduate program for the 2025-26 academic year. PMF Program is a flagship leadership development program at the entry level for advanced degree candidates. The PMF Program inculcates a lasting bond as well as a spirit of public service, ultimately encouraging and leading to a career in the government. Your two-year appointment will provide a fast-paced opportunity to

gain experience and develop your talents. You will be challenged with opportunities to flourish into a problem solver, strategic thinker and future leader. In addition to working at a single Federal agency, you may have the option to participate in a rotational opportunity at another agency. This highly selective, rigorous leadership program recruits recent graduates and current graduate students (who will complete an advanced degree by August 31 of the following year), particularly in (but not limited to) the areas of Accounting/Finance, Computer Science, Economics, Engineering, Foreign Policy/International Affairs, Environmental Science, Health/Medical Science, IT, Public Administration/Public Policy, and Public Health.

Artist Opportunity Grants (AOGs) support Arizona artists as they take advantage of specific, unique opportunities that have the potential to significantly impact their professional growth. As this grant is available to artists working in all disciplines and at any stage in their career, a wide array of opportunities could be considered eligible, so long as there is potential for significant impact in one or more of these three categories: introduce your work to new audiences, develop new skills, or develop your artistic entrepreneurship. Artists may request between \$500 and \$1,500 in funding.

#### The Charlotte W. Newcombe Doctoral Dissertation Fellowship

The Charlotte W. Newcombe Doctoral Dissertation Fellowships are designed to encourage original and significant study of ethical or religious values in all fields of the humanities and social sciences, and particularly to help Ph.D. candidates in these fields complete their dissertation work in a timely manner. In addition to topics in religious studies or in ethics (philosophical or religious), dissertations appropriate to the Newcombe Fellowship competition might explore the ethical implications of foreign policy, the values influencing political decisions, the moral codes of other cultures, and religious or ethical issues reflected in history or literature. Newcombe Fellows receive \$31,000 for 12 months of full-time dissertation writing.

#### **Getty Foundation Pre- and Postdoctoral Fellowships**

Getty Predoctoral and Postdoctoral Fellowships are intended for emerging scholars to complete work on projects related to the Getty Research Institute's annual research theme (Repair for 25-26), the African American Art History Initiative, or the Paul Revere Williams Research Project. Recipients are in residence at the Getty Research Institute or Getty Villa, where they pursue

research projects, complete their dissertations, or expand dissertations for publication. Fellows make use of the Getty collections, join in a weekly meeting devoted to the annual theme, and participate in the intellectual life of the Getty.

### Harry Frank Guggenheim Emerging Scholar Awards – Study of Violence

These awards of \$25,000 each are designed to contribute to the support of the doctoral candidate to enable them to complete the thesis in a timely manner and are only appropriate for students approaching the final year of their Ph.D. work. The Foundation welcomes proposals from any of the natural and social sciences, or allied disciplines, that promise to increase understanding of the causes, manifestations, and control of violence and aggression. Highest priority is given to research that addresses urgent, present-day problems of violence—what produces it, how it operates, and what prevents or reduces it.
